Injury & Violence

- Injuries and violence affect everyone, regardless of age, race or economic status. In the first half of life, more Americans die from injuries and violence (motor vehicle crashes, falls or homicides), than from any other cause (including cancer, HIV, or the flu), making it the leading cause of death among persons 1-44.
- Nearly 200,000 people die annually from injuries (approximately 1 person every 3 minutes). There are also millions injured annually who survive but are faced with life-long mental, physical and financial problems.
- Total economic cost of injuries and violence in the US was \$671 billion in 2013 (for both fatal and nonfatal injuries). (CDC)

Injury & Violence

- Over 33,700 people died in motor vehicle crashes
- Over 14,800 people died from prescription opioid overdoses
- Over 2 million elderly individuals were treated in ER's for fall injuries
- Over 300,000 kids were treated in ER's for sports and recreation-related concussions
- 1 in 7 children experienced abuse/neglect in the last year
- 20 people experience IPV every minute
- 1 in 2 women experience sexual violence in their lifetime
- 1 in 5 men experience sexual violence in their lifetime

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

Domestic Violence

- Domestic Violence affects over 10 million people each year and on average, 3 women are killed by a current or former partner each day. (National Network to End Domestic Violence)
- 72% of all murder-suicides involve an intimate partner; 94% of these murder victims are female
- More than half of female homicide victims were killed in connection to IPV. (CDC)
- IPV affects homicide rates of Black and Hispanic women at a much higher rate than other races. (CDC)
 - Black: 4.4 per 100,000 people
 - Hispanic: 1.8 per 100,000 people
 - White: 1.5 per 100,000 people
- A 2004 study showed that IPV costs the US economy over \$8 billion each year.

Domestic Violence

- South Carolina currently ranks 5th in the US for DV, with a homicide rate that is nearly double the national daily average. (Domestic Abuse Center)
- Females ages 18-34 experience the highest rates of DV. (CDC)
- 1 in 10 high school students experience physical abuse in a dating relationship each year (approximately 1.5 million students). (NCADV)
- 1 in 15 children are exposed to IPV each year, and 90% of those children are eyewitnesses to the violence. (NCADV)

Domestic Violence

- Pre-birth
- Infants/toddlers
- Adolescents
- Teenagers
 - The risk of becoming a victim as an adult/teen is greatly increased when raised in households where abuse is present. (NCADV)
- Adults
 - The risk of perpetrating IPV as an adult is 2 times higher for those who were abused or witnessed their mother being abused during childhood. (NCADV)
- Related issues: teen suicide, bullying, peer pressure, drug/alcohol use, risky sexual behavior. What else?
- So violence isn't happening in your home, can your child/teen still be affected? How?
